Jesus, and only about him as the crucified Christ.
Far from relying on any power of my own, I came
among you in great 'fear and trembling' and in my
speeches and the sermons that I gave, there were
none of the arguments that belong to philosophy;
only a demonstration of the power of the Spirit. And
I did this so that your faith should not depend on
human philosophy but on the power of God.

'You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill-top cannot be hidden. No one lights a lamp to put it under a tub; they put it on the lamp-stand where it shines for everyone in the house. In the same way your light must shine in the sight of men, so that, seeing your good works, they may give the praise to your Father in heaven.'

COMMUNION ANTIPHON


Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be consoled. Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall have their fill.

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The light is what we receive. We are light because He shares light with us – a gift at baptism. Our baptismal candle will be lit at big times of life, like confirmation, maybe Easter celebrations and at our funeral Mass.

It is lit from the paschal candle. This gesture is saying we get our light from Christ. The centre of our faith is our relationship with Jesus Christ. The second reading brings out the way we shine!

Light isn't just a light for me to see by.
