We are called to be members of God's own holy people. Today God is sending us out as witnesses for him.











Jesus preached the Kingdom of God and, in doing so, challenged the fixed attitudes, mind-sets and practices of good, God-fearing, religious persons, and revealed to them a new understanding of who God is and what God

wants. The result was opposition, rejection and death. The apostles, too, were given the task of going out and proclaiming the Kingdom of God. And they also discovered that doing so was seriously harmful to their health! The Church, today, is in crisis and the God which the Church had been proclaiming has been rejected by many. That God was a God whose passion was the observance of the law, expressed in rigid moral demands. Salvation, we were told, comes from observing the law. Pope Francis is calling us back to the God proclaimed by Jesus, a God whose passion is compassion, who reached out to the poor, the infirm, the excluded and to sinners. He healed lepers by touching them, an act of solidarity with those whom society shunned.

Pope Francis has a special concern for refugees, who are, for some, the lepers of today. Like Jesus, he too faces opposition from those whose fixed attitudes and mind-sets he challenges. Compassion is the ethos of the Kingdom of God and the door by which we enter it. Salvation, Pope Francis insists, comes from compassion. We, Christians, have been given the task of proclaiming the Kingdom of God today. We can only proclaim the God of compassion by being the compassion of God to others.
